


### "Of Rivers, Rhythms and Relics"

A GLIMPSE INTO ASSAM'S HEARTLANDS (5N/6D)



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Few regions flow with such quiet grace as Assam. Cradled by the eastern Himalayas and nourished by the Brahmaputra, this is a land where rivers write stories across time, forests hum with birdsong, and heritage endures in temples, songs, and silken weaves. Assam's rhythm has always been gentle yet unbroken, a meeting point of nature, culture, and faith.

But Assam is not one story. It is many. Home to a tapestry of communities - Ahom, Mishing, Karbi, Bodo, Tiwa, Koch, and countless others - the state carries layers of identity shaped by its rivers and hills. From the tea gardens of the plains to the bamboo homes of the river islands, every bend of the Brahmaputra reveals a new dialect, a new craft, a new way of life.

For centuries, the mighty Ahoms ruled these fertile plains, leaving behind grand temples, tank-fed palaces, and enduring traditions of craftsmanship. Their legacy still lingers in the red-brick ruins of Sivasagar and in the chants that echo through Majuli's satras, monasteries that have kept the teachings of Srimanta Sankardeva alive for over 500 years. Alongside this heritage lies another kind of wealth - the wild.



From the misty forests of Nameri to the floodplains of Kaziranga, life thrives in every form, from kingfishers darting above the Jia Bhoroli River to the one-horned rhino grazing beneath an open sky.

Yet Assam is more than relics and reserves. It is a lived landscape - one that moves to the rhythm of its people. Villagers cast their nets at dawn, weavers turn mulberry threads into golden Muga silk, and monks chant softly by oil lamp as the river flows past in quiet witness. The Brahmaputra binds it all together, a constant presence that both shapes and softens the land.

This journey traces that riverine rhythm - from forest to floodplain, from temple town to island monastery. Along the way, you'll walk through ancient capitals, drift on quiet waters, share laughter over local meals, and meet the artisans, farmers, and monks who keep Assam's spirit alive.

By the time you leave, you may find that Assam is not a place you have merely visited, but one you've listened to - in the rustle of bamboo, the chants of the satras, and the long, patient song of the river itself.




- Wake up to birdsong at a riverside eco-camp in Nameri National Park, where forest trails wind through bamboo and sunlight.
- Float down the Jia Bhoroli River, its calm waters carrying reflections of hornbills, kingfishers, and the emerald hills beyond.
- Witness the wild heart of Assam in Kaziranga National Park, home to rhinos, elephants, and the soft rustle of tall elephant grass.
- Step into a Karbi village to share stories, savour home-cooked meals, and watch weavers at their looms as smoke curls from kitchen fires.
- Walk through the Ahom-era temples and ruins of Sivasagar, where red bricks and water tanks hold centuries of memory.
- Sail across the Brahmaputra to Majuli Island, a world shaped by river, faith, and craft, where the day begins with prayer and ends with song.
- Meet the Mising community in their stilted bamboo homes, learning how the rhythms of the river shape daily life and art.
- Stay in charming eco-lodges and homestays that offer warmth, comfort, and evenings filled with stories and tea by the water's edge.

DAY 1- GUWAHATI TO NAMERI - INTO THE WILD

Your Assam journey begins in Guwahati, where the Brahmaputra flows wide and calm, carrying stories from the mountains to the plains. Leaving the city behind, the road meanders through the countryside, past tea gardens gleaming in the sun, bamboo groves swaying in the breeze, and small villages where time seems to move slower.

By afternoon, you arrive at Nameri National Park, a quiet stretch of wilderness at the foothills of the Eastern Himalayas. Your eco-camp sits on the edge of the forest, its wooden cottages surrounded by greenery and birdsong. The air is fresh and layered with the scents of earth, trees, and river, the unmistakable breath of the wild.

Settle in, sip a cup of Assamese tea, and let the evening unfold at its own rhythm. As dusk settles, the forest comes alive in whispers of cicadas and rustling leaves. The sounds of Nameri drift through the night, marking the beginning of your journey into Assam's gentle wilds.

#### DAY 2- FORESTS, BIRDS, AND RIVERS - NAMERI TO KAZIRANGA

Wake up to the soft chorus of forest sounds and the first light streaming through the trees. After an early breakfast, set out on a guided walk through the buffer zone of Nameri National Park. The trail leads you beneath tall trees and along sandy riverbanks where the forest floor hums with quiet life. You might spot colorful birds flitting between branches, butterflies drifting over wildflowers, or the distant splash of a fish in the stream.

Later in the morning, trade the forest path for the water as you step into a raft on the Jia Bhoroli River. The current is calm, carrying you gently past pebbled shores and overhanging branches. It's not an adventure of speed, but of stillness, where every turn of the river opens a new frame of forest and sky.

After lunch, bid farewell to Nameri and begin your drive toward Kaziranga National Park. The road follows the curve of the foothills, through tea gardens and golden fields, past small towns where roadside tea stalls serve steaming cups and easy laughter. By evening, you reach your lodge near the park, surrounded by the rustle of tall grass and the hum of night insects.

If you wish, step out for a short visit to the Orchid Park nearby, where a cultural performance brings alive Assam's folk traditions through music, dance, and storytelling. Return to your lodge for dinner and a restful night under the quiet Kaziranga sky.

#### DAY 3- WILD HEART OF ASSAM – A DAY IN KAZIRANGA

The day begins early, with mist still clinging to the tall elephant grass. After a warm cup of tea, set out for a jeep safari in one of Kaziranga's ranges. As the first light spreads across the wetlands, the park stirs to life. Rhinos graze quietly by the water's edge, herds of wild elephants move through the grasslands, and swamp deer lift their heads at the sound of your approaching jeep. Egrets, storks, and parakeets add flashes of color to the morning air, and if luck favours, you might even catch a fleeting glimpse of a tiger slipping through the reeds.

Return to your lodge for breakfast and a slow-paced morning of rest. Watch the countryside beyond your verandah or simply listen to the stillness that follows the wild's early chorus.

In the afternoon, head into the Karbi hills on Kaziranga's southern edge to visit a Karbi village. Here, bamboo houses rest lightly on stilts, and looms sing with the steady rhythm of weaving. Meet the women who turn natural fibers into vivid textiles, learn about their daily lives, and share a home-cooked lunch fragrant with herbs and smoke.

By evening, you return to your lodge. The air carries the scent of woodsmoke, and conversation drifts easily over dinner. It's a simple, grounding end to a day that brings you close to the pulse of Assam's wild heart.

#### DAY 4- ECHOES OF THE PAST - KAZIRANGA TO SIVASAGAR TO JORHAT

After breakfast, begin your journey eastward towards Sivasagar, once the proud capital of the Ahom dynasty that ruled Assam for nearly six centuries. The drive takes you through gentle countryside dotted with palm trees, small villages, and glimpses of rural life along the highway. On reaching Sivasagar, step back in time as you explore the remnants of an empire that shaped the history and culture of Assam.

Walk through the grand courtyards of ancient amphitheatres, the serene temple grounds, and vast man-made tanks that still shimmer with stories of the past. Visit the iconic Rang Ghar, often called the oldest amphitheatre in Asia, where royal gatherings and traditional games once took place. Take a quiet moment by the Sivasagar Tank, watching reflections of age-old temples ripple across the water.

By evening, continue your journey to Jorhat, where you can unwind and reflect on the day's encounters with Assam's living history.

DAY 5- ISLAND OF FAITH AND ART - DAY TRIP TO MAJULI

The day begins early as you drive to Neemati Ghat and board a ferry across the Brahmaputra. Morning fog drifts low over the river, softening its vastness into silver and quiet. As the boat glides through the mist, Majuli slowly takes shape - thatched roofs, bamboo groves, and the gentle rhythm of island life greeting the rising sun. Your time on the island moves unhurriedly. At the Satras, centuries-old monasteries, monks keep alive the teachings of Sankardeva through dance, music, and maskmaking. In Mising villages, homes stand on stilts above fields, and women weave intricate patterns inspired by the river's flow.

Lunch is a traditional Mising meal, cooked over wood fire and served with warmth - rice, smoked fish, local greens, and herbs from the fields. By late afternoon, the ferry carries you back across the Brahmaputra, its waters turning copper and rose in the setting sun.

Back at your stay in Jorhat, a bonfire awaits under the open sky. Flames flicker, tea - or perhaps some alcohol warming your spirit, if you please - in hand, and conversations flow softly into the night. A fitting farewell to Assam's rivers, its people, and the quiet grace that binds them together.

DAY 6- RETURN TO GUWAHATI – JOURNEY'S END

Your final morning in Assam unfolds gently under a pale winter sun. After a relaxed breakfast at your tea retreat, you are introduced to the world of tea tasting. Unlike a casual cup, this is about reading the tea, its colour, aroma, and strength, to understand how soil, season, and craft shape its character. As you sip and learn, stories of how tea first came to Assam and how its estates grew over time bring the experience to life.

The session takes place outdoors, overlooking quiet gardens where rows of bushes rest for the season. It is an unhurried and grounding farewell to the land that has given the world its most famous brew.

By late morning, you drive to Jorhat Airport, carrying with you the shimmer of the Jia Bhoroli, the wild heart of Kaziranga, and the stillness of Majuli. Assam lingers softly in memory, and in the aftertaste of tea.





- Expenses arising from unforeseen delays (weather, roadblocks, etc.).




- Best time to travel: October to April (ideal for safaris and clear ferry crossings).
- **Fitness level:** Easy to moderate, suitable for travellers of all ages with basic mobility.
- **Accommodation:** Eco-camps, boutique lodges, and homestays offering comfort and local character.
- **Connectivity:** Mobile networks available in most places; limited in Nameri and Majuli.
- Packing essentials: Light cotton clothes, walking shoes, binoculars, insect repellent, sun protection, and a reusable water bottle.



#### **General Refund Policy**

45+ days prior to starting date of the trip – 100% refund of the total trip cost 30-44 days prior to starting date of the trip – 75% refund of the total trip cost 15-29 days prior to starting date of the trip – 50% refund of the total trip cost 8-14 days prior to starting date of the trip – 25% refund of the total trip cost 7 days or less prior to starting date of the trip – No refund

#### What time does the trip start and end?

The trip starts from Guwahati at Noon and ends at Jorhat Airport.

Around 2-3 hours each way, depending on river conditions.

#### **Room Sharing**

Rooms are shared on twin sharing basis. In case you are a solo traveller, you will be paired up with another solo traveller of the same gender.

#### How much money we should carry?

While most of your expenses are taken care of, an additional Rs. 1,000 per day (upper limit) would be more than enough for all your expenses. Activities at Shnongpdeng range from Rs. 250 to Rs. 1000 per activity. You can take a look at our Exclusions to get a better understanding of how much money you may need.

#### Is rafting in Nameri safe for beginners?

Yes. It's a gentle rafting experience guided by trained professionals, designed for leisure and nature viewing.
